Top in the world for Cambridge Mathematics



Shrivar Mohan – N° 1 in the world for Cambridge Mathematics, and Warren Little – N° 1 in South Africa for Cambridge Chemistry

St Charles College boys have just scooped two prestigious “Cambridge Brilliance in the World” awards following the University of Cambridge International Examinations. Shrivar Mohan was awarded first place in the world with 100% for AS Level Mathematics. Warren Little received the top A Level result in Chemistry in South Africa for 2008. The Cambridge Representative for Southern Africa, Patti Borman, sent her personal congratulations to the School on these outstanding results.

Cambridge examinations are written in 157 countries across the world where up to ten million exam entries are received each year. It is gratifying to note that South African boys can match the best in the

world in Mathematics and Science subjects.

Both Shrivar and Warren were among the four St Charles College boys who scored a full house of three distinctions for their A Levels in November 2008. Warren is studying Engineering at Pretoria University and Shrivar is about to begin a degree in Aerospace Engineering at the University of Southampton, UK. The class of 2008 broke several academic records with six boys receiving acceptance into Medicine and a record number obtaining entry into Engineering, Actuarial Science and Bachelor of Science courses.

FROM THE HEADMASTER'S DESK

The second term has, as usual, been exceptionally busy for staff and the boys. It has, however, been rewarding to see how much our boys have developed in every facet of their lives.

The Grade 8s have become a united group of St Charles boys; the Grade 9s have acquired a greater sense of independence and self-confidence; the Grade 10s are impatient to move to the Upper School; the Grade 11s are "champing at the bit" to become the leaders of the School and the Grade 12s are giving serious thought to their tertiary education options.

Our boys and their teachers have done well and have moved St Charles's reputation to levels that were previously regarded as a mere pipe dream. They are commended for their commitment and loyalty.

Recently, at our annual Old Boys' Reunion Dinner, I had the pleasure of meeting the guest speaker, Andy Capostagno, who is a well-known TV sports commentator. During the evening we spoke about many things and, not least, the quality of schools in South Africa, particularly the schools in the KwaZulu-Natal Midlands. He recently moved to the Midlands because of 'the outstanding quality of education' in this region. There is little doubt that the competition amongst the Midlands' schools is the main reason for the excellence that is found here. Schools that embrace competition survive and prosper, whereas those that find excuses for non-performance eventually disappear from the scene. It is a South African tragedy, perhaps even a world tragedy, that regardless of quality of performance, the majority of teachers are still paid their salaries. However, it must be difficult to become inspired when standards that have been set for "competency" are so low. Motivation to do well can only be increased when the bar is raised. It is in the longer-term interests of our country that the achievement bar is raised and that salaries are linked to the performance of pupils in high quality external examinations and not in untested internally assessed assignments – our country has a long way to go in this regard.

Perhaps one of the areas of education that has not received sufficient attention is that of the teaching of social skills, skills that are learnt informally and outside of the classroom. Our boys were provided with appropriate opportunities in this regard when the rugby and hockey teams were billeted by the parents of St David's College in Johannesburg and when the St Alban's College rugby and hockey teams were hosted by our parents. Our boys had to learn how to behave as guests at St David's and then had to learn how to behave as hosts to the St Alban's boys. Correct social etiquette is learnt on these occasions and new friendships are established. I thank our parents who so generously opened their homes to the St Alban's community. A permanent fixture against St Alban's across all games has been secured and I understand that St David's is keen to visit us next year. Our boys did us proud on the behaviour front and have learnt that sport is a wonderful way of making lifelong friends. These fixtures emphasised the fact that sports fields are effective classrooms.

Our rugby and hockey teams have performed with distinction with a number of boys being selected to represent our region during the coming July vacation. At the time of writing this article it would appear that we have four boys in the Natal Craven Week A side; this is the largest number since the 1950s. Our tennis has become strong and we are proud that Greg Ford was selected for the SA Schools' U18 Tennis team. He is the first SCC boy to have achieved this honour.

At a recent strategic planning session the capacity of the Senior School was confirmed at 500 boys with the boarding target being set at 250 boys. The Board has however agreed to permit the addition of an extra Grade 8 class for 2010 because of the growing demand for places at the College, but the total enrolment will not exceed 500. In future it will therefore be possible to have certain Grades of more than 100 boys and other Grades of less than 100 boys. 25 boys will still be the maximum class size. The Preparatory School is expected to grow to 300 boys in the next three years.

These numbers have necessitated the building of additional facilities for 2010. An additional classroom will be built for the Senior School and three new classrooms will be built for the Preparatory School. Furthermore, plans are being prepared for the construction of additional boarding houses in the future.

During the course of this year a number of buildings and facilities have come into operation. The Physical Conditioning Centre and the new Boarding Establishment for the Upper School have been well received by our community of boys. The improvement in the physical strength of our boys has been exceptional and our Sports Scientist, Mr Rodwyn Isaacs, is commended on what has been achieved to date. New tennis courts have been completed and a number of improvements have been made to the Old Boys' Club (the Coach House).

The College Chapel was built during the 1960s to commemorate Old Boys who lost their lives in various international conflicts. SCC has lost Old Boys in the Anglo-Boer War, the First World War, Second World War and the Vietnam War. In the last few months the College has lost two of its boys, Samke Khumalo and Paul Lamoral, through tragic circumstances. As a consequence, the Management of the College decided to construct a Remembrance Garden to commemorate boys who have been prematurely taken away from us in civilian life. The garden will be built in front of Junior House and should be completed during the fourth term. A date for Remembrance Day will be provided in our Annual Calendar, and this day will be honoured in a special way.

In conclusion I would like to encourage you to keep up-to-date with current news at SCC by accessing our website at scc.co.za. In addition the College's annual publication "The Saint Chronicle" that was distributed at the commencement of this term is an excellent review of 2008, and our Marketing Manager, Mr Dean Riley, and advertising agent, Mr Justin Waldman, are commended.

I hope that you and your son(s) enjoy the July vacation.

An interesting interview on BBC World recently highlighted a programme taking place at five Illinois schools concerning money. In the light of

Subsequent to some analysis of these, the scholars were invited to join the programme. Its simple aim: learn to save, and then invest – money.

Amongst some of the results (outcomes!?) has been a joint savings plan for eight of the scholars at one of these schools; pooling their savings raised a “bigger capital” to invest on fixed deposit, thereby acquiring a higher interest rate.

money, whilst others delivered newspapers or house-sat and used this income for their contribution.

What did appear to be a ‘yes-yes’ was the sense of independence from their parents’ decision-making powers over them. And, perhaps this might well have been a stronger selling point than perhaps was at first realised.

How utterly simple!

Now, isn’t this something we did a generation or two ago? Before Freddie Mercury sang ‘I want it all, and I want it NOW!’ ‘Something good always comes out of something bad,’ my gran once told me. And these economic woes of the present are certainly here to help us re-assess greed, credit, loans, “fast money”, and the “here and now”. There is nothing wrong with learning to save, and certainly nothing wrong with learning that Einstein rated compound interest as the ‘greatest force known to man’. Indeed!

How many of our scholars have “ATM” cards? How many know their interest rate? How many save?

SPORTS IN THE PREP

Some truths about sugar

Sugar, also known as sucrose, is a carbohydrate. It is an ingredient that is found in almost every food and drink that we consider wonderful. From Coca-Cola to Nestea, from biscuits to chocolates, from bread to pastries, sugar is found in large quantities. We have become obsessed with carbohydrates that have high sugar content. Most people know that sugar is "bad" for you, but not everybody knows just how bad it is.

Within the body, sugar creates drastic spikes in your insulin level. High insulin levels promote fat storage and prevent fat being used as a fuel source during low intensity activity. Reading, writing, walking, jogging and even thinking are low intensity activities, to name a few, that use fat as a fuel source. Sugar prevents fat being used as a fuel source during low intensity activity and this leads to an increase in body fat. "Love handles" and that extra weight around the mid area are indications of this body fat.

Sugar weakens your immune system: research shows that one teaspoon of sugar suppresses your immune system for up to four hours. i.e. A can of Coca-Cola, which contains about 25 teaspoons of sugar, suppresses your immune system for up to four days. And that is just one can, add that to the chocolate and chips, no wonder we get sick so easily.

- Sugar weakens your body's defence against bacterial infection.
- Sugar causes hyperactivity and concentration difficulties.

- Sugar can adversely affect children's school marks.
- Sugar can weaken eyesight.
- Sugar speeds up the aging process, causing wrinkles and grey hair.
- Sugar increases the risk of coronary heart disease.
- Sugar can lead to alcoholism.
- Sugar interferes with the absorption of calcium. Yes, stay away from low-fat strawberry flavoured yoghurt.
- Sugar may lead to cancer of the prostate, colon and rectum, as well as ovarian and breast cancer.

Dare I say more! The list goes on and on and on...

With what should you replace sugar? Fruit is sweet because it contains fructose, which is also a carbohydrate. If you consume fruit daily, that would slow down the craving for sweet things. Low GI carbohydrates like vegetables, whole-wheat and rye breads, Durum wheat pasta and oats, to name a few, keeps you fuller for longer and maintain your blood glucose level throughout the day. This stops the cravings.

What about "sugar-free" food and drinks? Now this is another topic altogether. The gist of it is that "sugar-free" food and drinks contain non-nutritive sweeteners which can lead to depression, Alzheimer's disease, hyperthyroidism and other psychiatric states.

I would rather die than drink Coke Zero, but if I did drink it I'd probably die anyway.

Let me begin this by thanking all of you wonderfully generous and hospitable parents who opened their homes to our friends from over the Jukskei River. I have been inundated with letters and phone calls from all and sundry at St Alban's commenting on the friendly and welcoming way of our entire community.

I also thank all of you parents who allowed your boys to travel to St David's and stay in strange homes and into the "unknown". Thank you for trusting us as a staff and also the St David's staff – it is always a big ask. I have been asked by many why we make the effort and why we bother to drag ourselves from the comfort and safety of our families to take nearly 400 boys all the way to Gauteng to stay over with strangers in order to play sports matches.

The fact is that over next couple years very few will be strangers anymore.

The reasons are logical and simple. We need to give our boys quality opposition against like-minded and fairly matched

competitors. This type of opposition is becoming increasingly difficult to find locally – we owe it to our boys. The really important reasons are those of life skills and networking. It is critical in this modern age to re-teach social skills and simple hospitality. In a society that encourages people to communicate via Mix-it and Facebook, and to avoid human contact, we need to make every effort to allow our children to enjoy these experiences.

Standing at St David's at seven in the evening and seeing the stress and worry on our boy's faces was not easy for those there. Trusting people that one does not know are foreign feelings in our modern age. Dealing with boys on the verge of panic and with parents in an even worse condition is pretty daunting. As a parent myself (and a far too protective one at that) the responsibility stretched the nerves to breaking point but our faith in our friends and our Lord got us through. This experience led to serious soul searching

and the answers came in a flood when I saw our "Men" greet the boys from St David's. Handshakes in welcome, confident, self-assured and focused. The change in body language was phenomenal and for our staff, hugely satisfying – the very essence of an all-round education accomplished.

Many of our boys have had experiences that will stand them in good stead for the rest of their lives. Many will have made lifelong friends from this experience. The past five weeks have seen St Charles College develop into a truly competitive sporting school and an awful lot of this can be credited to the confidence gained on our trip to Gauteng.

In my considered opinion we have made the quantum leap that we have been searching for and it has come at a wonderful time in our School's forward progress on the winter sports fields.
